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CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

The rugby league landscape continues to evolve, and the 2024 season was highlighted by the success of two programs: wheelchair rugby league and the implementation of the Tackle Ready program, along with the graduation of Under 7s players from League Tag to tackle.

Wheelchair Rugby League



The Entice Travel Rolling Raiders won the NSWRL Wheelchair premiership in their debut year. This achievement followed several years of program development, which included purchasing equipment, finding suitable venues, conducting development days in Canberra and the region, and recruiting players to establish this new team in the competition.

The Wheelchair Rugby League space is continuing to expand and become more organised. The CRRL will soon affiliate with Wheelchair Rugby League Australia Limited (WRLA) and, after discussions with WRLA, will continue to service all of southern NSW as we work to establish hubs in Griffith, Wagga Wagga, Bathurst, and Albury-Wodonga.

I would also like to congratulate Steve Hewson on being awarded the Order of Australia Medal (OAM) for his services to rugby league, especially in wheelchair rugby league. Apart from being Monaro and Queanbeyan Blues royalty, Steve has coached the Australian Wheelaroos, the NSW team at the interstate carnival, and is also an international referee. It was Steve who came to Canberra to meet with myself and our General Manager, Mark Vergano, and convinced us to get involved in wheelchair rugby league. With his usual passion and energy, he played a key role in helping us establish the program.

Further congratulations to Toby Popple on being selected for the Australian Wheelaroos and for participating in the interstate matches against Queensland, as well as to Zac Carl for his selection in the New South Wales team.



Additionally, congratulations to Kale Popple for being appointed as head referee for the Wheelaroos vs New Zealand test matches alongside Steve Hewson.

As the Wheelchair program continues to grow, the support of Matt and Amy Hewson through Entice Travel, along with Kale Popple at Zatoma Transport, greatly enhances our ability to cover costs such as wheelchair repairs, travel, and the maintenance of the trailer that carries our equipment. The CRRL also wishes to highlight our strengthened relationship with Invictus as we reach out to athletes to join our program.

The CRRL is in negotiations with WRLA for Canberra to potentially host the touring Great Britain Wheelchair Rugby League team, which would play against a Canberra Rugby League Invitation team. This would be a significant recognition of the strength and administration of our wheelchair program.

Tackle Ready Program

The Tackle Ready program has been successfully rolled out, and I'd like to congratulate all the clubs, coaches, development officers, and CRRL staff involved. While any change associated with a new program can be challenging, we believe this initiative offers the best opportunity to enhance player skills in a supportive educational environment. It prepares children to learn to run, pass, and kick through the league tag component, separate to learning how to tackle, brace, and land.

from League Tag to tackle were an outstanding success, with NSWRL CEO Dave Trodden in attendance at Curtain. This type of ceremony will likely be rolled out in a similar fashion across the state.

I proposed a Tackle Ready-style program to the NSWCRL Board, and we'll be forwarding our recommendations to the NRL to implement it through Development Officers. This strategy responds to rising injury rates in the women's game and essentially aims to teach players how to tackle and be tackled safely – skills foundational in the boys' game.

Community Support

We extend our gratitude to the club volunteers and administrators who helped register 431 teams, facilitating around 195 matches each weekend. With over 6,500 participants, we are proud to be the fourth-largest competition in NSW.



The CRRL wishes to register its appreciation for the continued support of Blumers Lawyers as the competition's major sponsor. Mark Blumer and Ian Burchell continue to support rugby league and have always had a great interest in the development of female rugby league. We thank them for their support.

The Raiders Group of clubs and the Canberra District Rugby League continue to support both juniors and seniors' clubs, as well as the administration program undertaken by the CRRL. A special thanks to the Mawson Club for facilitating our AGM.

These supporters cover all referee fees for the junior competitions, as well as Friday night rugby league venue costs, saving around \$20 per junior registration. Our gratitude goes to the Queanbeyan Leagues Club, The Mawson Club, Raiders Weston, Raiders Belconnen, and the Canberra District Rugby League board.

The CRRL maintains a strong relationship with Capital Region Community Services and Everyman and, with community engagement now under CRRL, aims to expand partnerships with more organisations. This will enhance access to expertise in various social areas for players and clubs.

Last year, we received a \$25,000 community grant from IMB to purchase portable defibrillators from St John's Ambulance for junior clubs, and I'm pleased to share that CRRL contributed an additional \$5,000 to ensure every junior club received one for their Head Trainer. This initiative by IMB highlights rugby league's commitment to player safety through our exceptional first aid trainer system. Thanks to our skilled personnel and CRRL staff, we were invited to present on Concussion Protocols at the NSWRL Annual Conference.

NSWRL and Judiciary

The NSWRL continues to support the CRRL, and our relationship is evolving with increased cooperation in various areas. Access to the NSWRL HQ in Bruce has greatly benefited the Belconnen Sharks, our referees, and representative teams.



Ongoing collaboration between CRRL and NSWRL focuses on Judiciary matters and developing a unified strategy for the regions. We appreciate our relationship with CEO Dave Trodden, CFO Dean Webster, Facilities Manager Ben Jessimar, Regional Manager Dave Skinner, and Monaro representative Jake McDonald.

I have been fortunate to continue in my role as a director of the NSW Community Rugby League Board which is focused on increasing resources and participation at community level.

This year, the CRRL Judiciary has expanded its role in partnership with the NSWRL, now hearing cases for Group 20, Group 16, Group 9 (as applicable), and Touch Football ACT, while also contributing to the overall system's development. We extend our gratitude to Co-Chairs Chris Gribble and Bwalya Chifuntwe, along with Sarah Rodrigues, Appeals Chair Jonathan Hanton, and the entire Judiciary panel, including Geoff Milczuk, Phil Stuart, Danny Roper, John Cooper, Papunya Connors, Rob Scott, and Bernard Powderly. A special thanks to Glyn Sargent, Head of the Match Review Committee, for his unwavering commitment to this demanding role throughout the season.

Referees

Our referees continue to be the unsung heroes of the CRRL. With growing participation numbers, they often officiate matches across all three days of the weekend or manage multiple junior games in a single day, sometimes traveling between venues to cover as many matches as possible. This places significant pressure on them, and we urge coaches, managers, spectators, and supporters to nurture and support our referees, many of whom referee for 3-4 hours straight. We thank the Canberra District Rugby League Referees Association for their ongoing collaboration with CRRL administration and look forward to maintaining our close relationship.



Closing Remarks

The CRRL Committee continues to oversee the competitions professionally and have been a tremendous support to me as Chairman. We welcomed Michelle Jopling and Ian Gorman to the committee, and they have transitioned seamlessly into their new roles. We thank them for their valuable contributions.

The CRRL operations staff continues to excel in the delivery of rugby league in the region and beyond. I thank them for their continued professionalism and the relationships they have developed with the clubs and with the NSWRL.



Thank you to Don Furner and the Raiders staff for your ongoing support of community rugby league. Your commitment provides us access to GIO game day activities, visits from Raiders men's and women's players to clubs, and significant investment in rugby league throughout the region and southern NSW.

It has been a privilege to once again serve the game we all love as Chairman of the CRRL, and I look forward to an even more successful 2025.

GENERAL MANAGER'S REPORT

The 2024 season was another one of success and expansion for the CRRL.

- An increase in participation of 6.13% overall
- An increase in male participation of 4.4%
- An increase in female participation of 13.75%
- Remained the 4th largest rugby league region in the NSWRL.
- The Rolling Raiders won the NSW Wheelchair Tier 1 competition on debut.
- Monaro was successful in winning the Laurie Daley Cup competition.
- The Canberra Representative League Tag team won the NSW carnival.
- Monaro Open Men's finishing runners up to Newcastle in the Country Championships.
- The George Tooke Shield representative teams won both the Men's and League Tag matches against the Woodbridge Cup representative teams.
- Katrina Fanning was inducted into the NRL & ACT Sports Hall of Fame.
- All Raiders Cup clubs had a Katrina Fanning Shield team for the first time.
- Acknowledged as one of the leaders in concussion management and reporting in the state.

This is just a snapshot of the more high-profile successes that the organisation has achieved this year but as always, there is still much work to be done to ensure the health of the game and that our participants have a place to play.

Facilities

The CRRL was extremely disappointed with the state of the grounds at the conclusion of the rugby league season whereby the junior preliminary finals were transferred to Freebody Oval due to the poor condition of Gungahlin, Greenway and Boomanulla Ovals. The ACT Government has been made aware of rugby league's dissatisfaction with the condition of the ovals notwithstanding that they were at the end of a long season. The CRRL would expect a response with better facilities for the 2025 season.

We thank our volunteers and trainers for bringing the poor conditions to our attention and for your care towards our players.

On a more positive note, the Phillip District Oval redevelopment has commenced; there have been improvements to Melba and the new Stromlo grounds have been commissioned with two rectangular synthetic fields and a rectangular turf field to be part of the complex.


During the season, the CRRL provided the ACT Government with its priority list of ground development and projects to be undertaken. In support of this, the CRRL also produced an election manifesto highlighting projects that would need to be undertaken in each electorate, and this was distributed to the three major parties and followed up with meetings. With the re-election of the ALP-Greens coalition the CRRL will be following up with the new Ministry as to the projects we will attempt to get funding for. As previous, the development of Taylor remains our priority to assist the full re-location of the Gungahlin Bulls seniors and juniors.

Participation & Retention Statistics

It was gratifying to see the increase in participation and the first year of the Tackle Ready Program leading to the Under 7 Graduation Day's at Curtin and Goulburn where the group transitioned from their league tag introductory phase into the tackle phase.

We have been pleased with the consistent growth in the game as illustrated by the accompanying graphs supplied in this publication. Whilst we were pleased with the growth and engagement with the girls league tag and seeing the girls Under 15 tackle competition flourish, we were exceptionally pleased to see growth in the boys area. This will still require a focus and an understanding of how we still bring boys through to the game. (Refer to "Junior Competition Statistics" page for details.)


One of the important pieces of data that the CRRL staff has been compiling is that of retention rates. It was pleasing to see that the CRRL was above the national average for retention rates in 2024. The national average was 70.89% and for the CRRL it was 73.93%. Compared to 2023, this was an improvement for the CRRL which rose from 71.51%.



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Again, the numbers are instructive and highlight areas we must work on. Male averages were 72.42% nationally, whilst the CRRL was 75.96%. Again, an improvement in this category. However, whilst the CRRL female retention rate was above the national average at 67.76% compared to 64.89%, female retention was down 8% compared to male retention.



These numbers simply indicate that as a game, we still must make the female experience better to increase retention. Overall, we need to understand the participants' experience and ensure we give everyone as positive an experience as possible.



Concussion Management

Concussion remains an existential threat to the game of rugby league and without a concerted and all-of-game approach to protecting our players, the game could be imperilled. We all have a role to play whether it's how we teach children to tackle; the application of the rules under the Safe Play code; the understanding of our responsibility in removing players from the field if they take a knock.



The CRRL operations wishes to praise all our trainers and first aid people for their diligence in protecting our players with their diagnoses and then recording the injuries. Due to the efforts of our trainers and the CRRL staff, the NSWRL recognised that the Canberra Region has the best reporting rates of any area in NSW. To that end, the CRRL staff presented to the NSWRL Regional Managers and Development Officers initially online and then at the NSWRL State Conference. The ability of our trainers to come together as a cohort and look at collective action, plus supporting each other, has built an inclusive environment in which our players are the beneficiaries.

Competitions

The competition aspect of the CRRL being the Canberra Raiders Cup, Katrina Fanning Shield, George Tooke Shield, the Junior competitions and the representative teams were once again strong and well managed by the CRRL staff and the volunteer administrators from our clubs.

The Queanbeyan Kangaroos made it backto-back premierships with a hard-fought win over the resurgent Queanbeyan Blues who reconfigured the club after its *"annus horribilis"* from 2023.

Yass continued to be the club of the Katrina Fanning Shield avenging a Grand Final loss from the previous year and Woden once again dominated the League Tag for three consecutive premierships.

There is a trend for a number of Canberra based players to move from the Katrina Fanning Shield to teams in the Harvey Norman Premiership (HNP). Players view this route as being able to be identified by other NRLW clubs. Mt Pritchard, Wentworthville and Cronulla had multiple Canberra players in their ranks. This attests to the quality of the women players being produced through the Katrina Fanning Shield and the CRRL still has the aim of making the KFS competition the best outside of Sydney. The Raiders NRLW staff and the CRRL are working together to service the local teams and talent.



A major change for the Canberra Raiders Cup this year was the introduction of a player draft for the allocation of Canberra Raiders SG Ball and Jersey Flegg contracted players to local Raiders Cup clubs. This first year of the player draft system was well received by clubs and will become more formalised over the next few seasons.

It was pleasing to see that every Raiders Cup club had a Katrina Fanning Shield team (Kangaroos and Bungendore joined forces), and eight of the nine Raiders Cup clubs had an Under 19s team.

The George Tooke Shield saw Harden in both finals. The Harden Hawkettes maintained their dominance to make it a threepeat and Bungendore claimed their first title since 2015 in defeating Harden.

The representative program had a number of highlights, with the Rolling Raiders claiming the premiership in their debut NSW Wheelchair competition season, defeating the St George Illawarra Dragons 50-36 in the Grand Final, with Zac Carl earning Player of the Match honours.

The strength of League Tag in the region was demonstrated with Canberra winning the NSW Blues Tag State Championships on the Central Coast going through undefeated and beating Newcastle in a tight final 12-6. Harden's Clare Smith was player of the carnival.

Both George Tooke representative sides were victorious against Woodbridge Cup, claiming a dominant 42-18 win in the League Tag, followed by a tight 18-10 victory from the Men's team.

The Monaro Laurie Daley Cup team was triumphant for the first time in their history with a 28-18 win over the Northern Rivers in the final. Outstanding matches by Mitchell Brophy and Jonah Anderson got the Colts home.



The Open Men's Monaro team came close but ran into a strong Newcastle outfit going down 20-4 in the Country Championship Grand Final.

The junior competitions were well conducted, with a key change this season as the Under 11 age group transitioned to a non-competitive format. This aligns with the CRRL's ongoing shift to make Under 12 non-premiership, while international-grade rugby league from Under 13 and above will serve as the premiership grades, in line with the Player Development Framework agreement with NSWRL.

One of the well-received programs this year was having the availability of NRLW and State of Origin stars Sophie Holyman and Grace Kemp to visit local clubs on their training nights. This was a terrific promotion for female rugby league and the players certainly embraced having Grace and Sophie run around with them.

A new concept this year was a "Magic Round' for the Boys Under 14 and Under 15 competitions. The purpose of the Magic Rounds was to allow the Raiders pathway coaches to view all players together in one place as they looked to formulate their development squads. The Under 15s were held at Melba and the Under 14s at Curtin.

One noticeable change this season was the increase in insurance costs for players and clubs. The CRRL was forced to raise its fee per player for the first time in 10 years from \$20 to \$25. Whilst the rise wasn't welcomed, the fact that we have been able to keep the fee per player at a similar rate for 10 years shows the strength of the centralised insurance system.

The CRRL in partnership with Group 16 once again held the Monaro-Bateman's Bay Knockout for the second time at McKay Park, Bateman's Bay. There were an increased number of teams in this year's carnival and the tournament was well supported by good crowds. Binalong league tag team won their Cup division defeating Eden 22-10 in the final and Eden men were too strong for the Molong Bulls 28-0 in their final.



Administration

A major piece of work undertaken this year was the categorisation process for the ACT Government's Sport & Recreation Department. This program sees a number of compliance and best practice measures being adopted by local sports organisations. This compliance then leads to a categorisation which in the case of the CRRL/Raiders was an \$85,000 grant for a project that must be topped up with another 25% investment from the organisation.

The project that the CRRL/Raiders committed to undertake is the employment of a Coach Developer, primarily focussed on assisting club coach coordinators and junior coaches at the "coalface". We view this role as helping to establish standards but also being a resource for those coaches in our younger age groups that take on this demanding role.

The Junior clubs this season had coach, manager and trainer sessions conducted as part of their education and in-servicing. These were conducted by Juniors' coordinator, Stacey Studholme, along

with the Raiders pathway coaches. The coach developer will be on hand in a fulltime capacity in their new role to build on this initiative.

Judiciary

The CRRL conducted judiciary education sessions for all clubs across the Juniors, Raiders Cup and George Tooke Shield competitions. These sessions were to assist clubs in nominating a person to understand the whole range of procedures in both the judiciary and disciplinary areas, as well as how hearings are conducted. The CRRL seeks to have the best prepared clubs, although we do not want too many appearances for anyone!



Overall, player behaviour this season was commendable with few melees and matches generally played in good spirits. This was the first year of having a reporting system for all senior grades, and whilst the workload of citings increased, as would be expected, the referees were conscious of their responsibilities and utilised the operation of the reporting system well. Players also generally played their part.



However, as always in a season we had some incidents that were certainly not in the spirit of the game. One high profile incident led to a 10-year ban for the perpetrator and a 20-match ban for a 're-entering of the field' (served as 10 matches with discounts) and striking. No league wants to impose these bans on club supporters, but the CRRL will not resile from making long suspensions as appropriate.

This incident also led to CRRL and ACT Rugby Union coming to an agreement to recognise each other's suspensions greater than two matches. Both codes believe this is in the best interests of the respective competitions and adds further protection for players.



Referees

Apart from disorderly behaviour by some parents on the sidelines, the other areas of contention from a disciplinary perspective are the league safes and the citizen touch judges. The CRRL Disciplinary Committee consistently cited league safes for not retreating from a melee or persisting in staying on the field longer than is applicable. This is compounded with any getting involved with the referees. The same goes for citizen touch judges who believe holding the flag gives them permission to criticise a referee. This needs to stop and people must understand what their responsibilities are.

Once again, our referees have done an outstanding job. The growth of our participation rates has added extra pressure to the number of referees available on any given weekend and a number of referees undertake matches across Friday, Saturday and Sunday, and others will do 3-4 hours in a row. This is both physically and mentally taxing and we ask for all supporters to recognise that many referees are at different stages of development and need support and education rather than criticism, and worse still, abuse.

To that end, the referees' association and the CRRL have trialled the grey socks identifier for first year referees so that players, coaches, managers and supporters know that the officiating referee is new to the game.





Female Participation in both Tackle and League Tag



NAMING OF AWARDS

Les McIntyre Medal - The Canberra Raiders Cup First Grade Best and Fairest Award is named after Les McIntyre OAM who was the founding father of the Canberra Raiders. McIntyre was awarded life membership at the Canberra Raiders, Country Rugby League, and New South Wales Rugby League.

Don Furner Snr Shield – The Canberra Raiders Cup First Grade Coach of the Year award is named after former Australian representative Don Furner Senior. During his playing years, Furner also represented Queensland before enjoying a successful coaching career. Furner coached Australia, the Queanbeyan Blues, and was also the inaugural coach of the Canberra Raiders.

Leedon Shield – The Canberra Raiders Cup Reserve Grade Best and Fairest award is named after Lee Donnelly who helped pave the way for the Raiders' entry to the NSWRL competition in 1982. He was heavily involved with the Woden Valley Rams and was also awarded life membership of the old Group 19 competition.

David Sharpe Award – The Canberra Raiders Cup Under 19's Best and Fairest Award is named after David Sharpe. Sharpe was involved in rugby league in the Canberra Region as a player for the Queanbeyan Blues before helping establish senior rugby league in Tuggeranong with the Valley Dragons and Tuggeranong Bushrangers. Sharpe coached both sides. He was well known for his role as football manager with the Canberra Raiders where he implemented education, development, and welfare programs for the NRL.



Gavin Miller Shield – The George Tooke Shield Open Men's Best and Fairest Award is named after two-time Dally M Medalist Gavin Miller. Miller played for a number of clubs but is best remembered for his stint at Cronulla where he was named as a club immortal. Miller also played for Goulburn during the late 1970's and early 1990's.

Sarah Carter Medal – The Canberra Raiders Cup League Tag Best and Fairest Award is named after one of the original players of the competition, Sarah Carter. Carter joined the competition at its inception in 2016, initially representing the Belconnen United Sharks. She went on to play for the West Belconnen Warriors from 2018-2022 where she was named Player of the Year in both 2019 and 2022 and is a three-time leading point scorer.

Emma James Medal - The George Tooke Shield League Tag Best and Fairest Award is named after Emma James. James is a long-standing Harden Hawkettes team member and has been instrumental in their success, earning five Best and Fairest awards and winning six premierships.

Hewson/Stonham Shield - The Representative Player of the Year Award is named after Steve Hewson and Phil Stonham. Steve Hewson, who was awarded an Order of Australia in 2023, represented Monaro, NSW Country, NSW, and was named Country Player of the Year in 1975. He is now involved in developing the overall strategy for NSW Wheelchair Rugby League, and in previous years has coached the Wheelaroos and NSW Wheelchair State of Origin teams. Phil Stonham enjoyed a long representative career with Monaro and was named Canberra Region as well as Country Player of the Year in 2004. Stonham played for the Queanbeyan Blues throughout most of his playing career.



Noel Bissett Trophy – The Outstanding Referee Award is named after former NSWRL referee and former CRRL Chairman, Noel Bissett. Bissett, who was awarded an Order of Australia in 2013, officiated in 275 Group 8 matches including 11 Grand Finals. Bissett is a life member of the Canberra Raiders and was also the president of the Canberra/Monaro Men of League charity.

Don Elphick Medal – The award for Outstanding Rookie from the Canberra Region and the Canberra Raiders is named after Don Elphick. Elphick played an instrumental role in the formation of the Canberra Raiders and is a life member of the club.

ACCREDITATION REPORT

Building on the success of our accreditation compliance in 2023, 2024 proved to be another outstanding season. Thanks to the dedication of our accredited volunteers, both the Junior and Senior competitions thrived.

As in previous seasons, we encountered challenges, but the communication and relationship between CRRL and the clubs continued to strengthen. This enhanced communication led to a higher compliance rate among both coaches and sports trainers. Although we have yet to achieve our goal of 100% compliance, we are trending upward and remain committed to reaching this target in 2025.

In total, we offered 13 community coach courses (seven for ages 6-12 and six for ages 13+), along with nine League First Aid and Sports Trainer courses. Additionally, we conducted seven CPR refreshers, three Tackle Ready deliverer courses,



and piloted the U6-7 Community Coach education workshop. These new offerings allowed us to better educate and support our growing cohort of coaches and sports trainers, servicing 325 new coaches and 225 new sports trainers.

A recurring challenge has been the number of courses available for trainers, and we are continually working to organise new sessions to accommodate the rising registrations. It is crucial that we maintain these relationships to ensure all courses are filled in a timely manner.

In 2024, we saw an increase in our Sports Trainer and League Safe numbers. This led to our largest contingent of sports trainers.

The Tackle Ready program, facilitated by NRL Game Development Officers Shane Read and Taylor Giggins, continued to show significant progress. As part of the Player Development Framework (PDF), this program helps coaches and players learn proper tackle techniques. U7 coaches and players engage in tag for the first six weeks of their competition while practicing tackling skills, transitioning to tackle in Round Seven.



In 2024, after completing the Tackle Ready Program, the U7s participated in a gala day to showcase their new tackling abilities. Each participant received a Tackle Ready graduation certificate during the event. We have received positive feedback regarding the program's implementation, and parents are proud to see their children learning safe tackle techniques.

I commend everyone for their patience and support as we maintained a strong focus on our Concussion Protocols. The processes we have implemented over the past few seasons have empowered our Sports Trainers to confidently identify and report any suspected concussions. In 2024, we were ranked #1 in NSW for our concussion management and reporting. This will remain a key priority for us in 2025 as we continue to enhance the confidence of our Sports Trainers and ensure clear communication regarding any changes to the protocols.



Overall, 2024 was a successful year for our accreditation efforts. We effectively built on the relationships developed with our trainer cohort and will continue to nurture these connections in 2025.

Our primary focuses for the upcoming year will be achieving 100% compliance in accreditations, managing registrations for working with vulnerable people and children, and enhancing concussion management and reporting. The importance of ensuring compliance is met is for overall safeguarding of the players and volunteers involved and to ensure they can continue to play community rugby league in safe, knowledgeable, and supportive environment.

We are committed to supporting our coaches and trainers, ensuring they feel equipped with the knowledge needed to perform their roles confidently. I look forward to collaborating with everyone in 2025.

2024 was a successful year for our inclusion programs, the Rolling Raiders and the Score Raiders. Their growth and success were evident, with increased support highlighting their role as vital pillars of community rugby league.

This year, we had a jam-packed calendar of Wheelchair Rugby League events, hosting 16 Community Come and Try sessions across various locations, including Tuggeranong, Wagga Wagga, Griffith, Canberra City, Belconnen, AIS, and GIO Stadium. These events provided a platform to attract new participants and support the growth of our program. Although we couldn't establish a viable local competition this season, the Rolling Raiders gained entry into the NSW Cup Wheelchair Rugby League competition.

After a tough start, losing their first four games, the Rolling Raiders achieved their inaugural victory against the West Tigers in front of a packed Wagga crowd. Competing in a four-team league, the Rolling Raiders finished the regular season in fourth place and embarked on a remarkable finals run, defeating the West Tigers, Parramatta Eels, and Dragons in successive weeks to be crowned the 2024 NSW Cup Wheelchair Rugby League premiers.

Rolling Raiders superstar Zac Carl was named Player of the Match in the Grand Final and received the season MVP award. In total, 11 players proudly donned the lime green jersey for the Rolling Raiders in 2024.

After a stellar season, Rolling Raiders Captain/Coach Toby Popple represented NSW Blues in the 2024 Wheelchair Interstate Challenge, where they narrowly lost to Queensland in July. This performance paved the way for him to reach the pinnacle of Wheelchair Rugby League by representing the Australian Wheelaroos on their historic first-ever tour of New Zealand in November. The Wheelaroos achieved impressive victories in both test matches, with a combined margin of 208-12.

In May, Zac Carl and Toby Popple also represented NSW Country, while Brad Burns, Amanda Carlyon, Jaimz Knight, Mitchell Sentence, and Victoria Simpson played for the NSW Country Barbarians in the NSW City vs. Country curtainraiser, which was coached by Carl and Popple.

This season wouldn't have been possible without our wonderful sponsors, Entice Travel and Zatoma Transport, who have been integral to the development and growth of our program. We look forward to continuing our partnership with them as the Rolling Raiders aim to defend their premiership and welcome a team into the NSW Plate second-tier competition.



We also experienced significant growth in regional development and school engagement this year. Following our late inclusion in Sporting Schools in 2023, we serviced 20 different school programs and showcased Wheelchair Rugby League to over 1,000 new school-aged players. In November, we hosted our first-ever schools' gala day, with four colleges participating, and a primary school event in early December that attracted six schools.

Wheelchair Rugby League hit the road again with programs in Griffith, Wagga Wagga, Albury, and Goulburn. In 2025, we will focus on establishing viable programs in these regions while revisiting Bathurst and the Central West.

The CRRL continued its partnership with the Disability Trust and Score Raiders in 2024, during which the Score Raiders recorded their largest participation numbers to date. They were once again integrated into the U14 competition and remained competitive against some of the strongest teams in the league. We extend our gratitude to all clubs for their continued support of this program.

On September 15th, the Score Raiders faced off against the Score Dragons at GIO Stadium but unfortunately fell short. Their season culminated with a narrow Grand Final loss to the Whistleblowers at NSWRL HQ in Bruce on September 23rd, a game that was well received by fans and spectators alike. The Score Raiders are determined to return stronger than ever in 2025.

ROLLING RAIDERS SEASON WRAP

The Canberra Rolling Raiders debuted in the 2024 NSW Wheelchair Rugby League competition, transitioning from several years of non-competitive local play to joining the league and broadening opportunities for players to represent their communities on a larger stage.

The Rolling Raiders had four players with NSW Cup level experience in Bradley Burns, Zac Carl, Chris O'Brien and Captain/Coach Toby Popple. Amanda Carlyon had previous experience playing in the tier 2 NSW Plate competition in 2023. New players to the competition included Nick Alexander, Jaimz Knight, Anthony McQueen, Jamie Osborne, Mitchell Sentence, and Victoria Simpson.

With several new players, the Rolling Raiders faced the added challenge of competing against teams featuring seasoned players from representative sides like the NSW Blues and the Australian Wheelaroos.

The season began with two games in Sydney, where the Raiders had a slow start, losing both matches but gaining valuable experience.

Rounds Three and Four were held at Queanbeyan PCYC, marking the first time teams travelled outside Sydney for this competition. Despite the Raiders losing both games, the matchdays thrilled the home crowd, and the team showed promising improvement, boosted by the addition of Brad Burns in Round Three.

In Round Five, the West Tigers travelled to Wagga Wagga for the area's firstever competitive Wheelchair Rugby League match, giving local players Toby Popple, Zac Carl, and Jaimz Knight a chance to showcase the sport at home.

Despite the Tigers fielding only four players, the Raiders, strengthened by returning representative Chris O'Brien and the support of an enthusiastic Wagga crowd, secured their first win of the season in this 5v4 matchup.



In the next round, the Rolling Raiders faced the top-of-the-table St George Illawarra Dragons, who secured the Minor Premiership with the win. Despite the loss, it was the Raiders' strongest showing of the season, boosting their confidence for the semi-finals. In the first week of finals, they faced the thirdplaced West Tigers, captained by Australian Wheelaroos leader Brad Grove, and delivered a controlled, cohesive performance to advance to the preliminary final.



In the preliminary final, the Rolling Raiders faced the reigning premiers, the Parramatta Eels, who featured three past and present Wheelaroos representatives. The match opened with fierce intensity, as both teams were locked in an arm-wrestle. By halftime, the Raiders held the lead, with Parramatta facing a setback after Captain Liam Luff was sidelined by a failed HIA, leaving them with four players. The Raiders seized the advantage, powering through the second half to secure their spot in the 2024 Grand Final.

The Rolling Raiders faced the minor premiers, the Dragons, led by the formidable father-son duo Cory and Craig Cannane. Entering the match as underdogs, the Raiders endured an intense start, with both teams making early errors. Despite this, the Raiders struck first, taking a narrow lead into halftime. The Dragons responded strongly in the second half, gradually edging closer on the scoreline, but the Raiders held their nerve to secure victory in the 2024 Grand Final.



After winning just one of six regular season matches, the Raiders peaked at the right time, winning three consecutive finals matches to clinch the NSW Cup in their debut season.

The 2024 NSW Cup Wheelchair Rugby League competition offered valuable experience for all participants, with both new and returning players gaining confidence for 2025. The Rolling Raiders aim to further grow the game in the ACT and Southern NSW, with plans to establish a second-tier NSW Plate team next season.

Zac Carl was named Player of the Match in the Grand Final and also received the Rolling Raiders MVP award, while Toby Popple was selected for the NSW team and earned a spot on the Australian Wheelaroos for their tour of New Zealand in November.

GAME DEVELOPMENT REPORT

Firstly, we would like to thank all the clubs, schools, and volunteers for their continued support of our programs throughout 2024. We appreciate all the hard work that you do and there would not be a game without your dedication.

NRL Canberra is still working in the Southern NSW game development team in 2024. These areas include Canberra, Illawarra, Tablelands, South and Far South Coast regions.

2024 has been a successful year for everyone. NRL Canberra delivered an increased number of Secondary school programs in semester one and term three including Sporting Schools, LIFT and Tackle Ready programs. This increase in interest from secondary schools is very encouraging for the recruitment and retention of players aged 13+ in the CRRL District.

Our NRL Southern NSW Development team have once again conducted many events, competitions and education courses and community events. REFEREES REPORT

2024 was another challenging year where the local competitions showed an overall increase in the number of players by 6.2%. Female participation had increased by 13.8%. This equated to 195 games of tackle and tag rugby league each weekend.

All our members should be congratulated on the professionalism and dedication they showed throughout the season, especially those who officiated in multiple games over three days each weekend. As usual for Canberra we had quite a number of mornings that were very "cold". However, it was not just the mornings that were cold, we had one weekend where the First-Grade game at 4pm was officiated in (feels like) minus degrees temperature, certainly testing everybody's resolve and commitment.

Recruitment continued to be very strong with 42 candidates undertaking the Referees U6-U12 Years course. Whilst this was very promising, the demographics and playing careers of the new members presented us with a challenging jigsaw to solve and balance each weekend. 30 of the new members were aged between 13 and 16 and still involved as players. With the structure in Canberra being that all U7 to U15 games are played on a Sunday morning meant that finding games for these new referees was only possible through the assistance of the CRRL Junior Competition Manager who re-organised game times to give our new members the best chance of officiating in these games.



We are lucky to have organisations such as the Canberra Raiders and Canberra Region Rugby League support our Association and assist with recruitment and development of referees.



The support from the CRRL staff, especially General Manager Mark Vergano and Chairman Gary Green cannot be under-estimated. Incidents involving unsavoury conduct by players, officials or spectators were swiftly dealt with by the League, sending a strong message that poor behaviour is not acceptable, and match officials will be supported by them.

Achievements

On the Representative front we had a Junior Representative Squad with referees in both Regional and Metro Squads. (Tristan Brooker, Liam Richardson, Thomas Rynehart and Gage Miles). Gage was promoted to the Graded Squad early in the year. Congratulations to Martin Jones and Gage Miles for their achievements with the NSW High Performance squad in 2024. Martin refereed the Sydney Shield Grand Final and Gage the in-goal touch judge in that same game. Their success serves as an inspiration for all our members.

JUDICIARY REPORT

In 2024, judiciary hearings were again held in person, with out-of-town clubs being given the option to either appear in person or by zoom. It should be noted that whilst appearing via zoom was good for some clubs it also came with technical difficulties that made the judicial hearing longer and more frustrating for all parties concerned.

For the 2024 season there were a total of 190 send off and citing in total across the senior and junior competitions, 142 of these offences occurred in the seniors, 48 offences occurred in the juniors. The increase in the number of offences brought before the MRC can in part be attributed to the fact that offences in all senior grades from Under 19's were made reportable by referees this year.

Striking remains the most common offence with 38 occurrences (clubs are reminded that this is a non-contestable 1 match suspension if proven). The second most common offence was Unnecessary Heavy Contact with 29, this number is directly contributable to the sometimes-borderline timing of late tackles. Dangerous throw charges also increased this year and are of major concern due to their capacity to cause serious injuries to the tackled player.



The continued abuse of match officials by players, officials and parents/ spectators increased quite dramatically and clubs should be encouraged to remind all their stakeholders that this will not be tolerated and those bodies found guilty of match official abuse will be penalised heavily.

Unfortunately, a major concern again for the CRRL and the judiciary in 2024 was the ever-increasing occurrence of unacceptable off field behaviour by team officials, parents and spectators. The behaviour exhibited in some of these cases resulted in lengthy suspensions. Clubs are reminded that it is their responsibility to ensure that their officials, players, and parents behave in a manner that matches the NRL Code of Conduct for these groups and that failing to do so can, and has, resulted in clubs being placed on good behaviour bonds for lengthy periods of time.

Whilst acknowledging that it is difficult for clubs to ensure all volunteers and team officials understand their roles and responsibilities on game day and that at times these volunteers can be called upon at short notice there were a number of incidences where the volunteer touch judges, and league safes overstepped their roles placing themselves and the players in potentially dangerous positions.



Again, it is the club's responsibility to ensure that if people are given a role, then this should be explained to them.

Finally, clubs, particularly junior clubs, should be reminded that an appearance at a judicial hearing is not an opportunity to question the referee's integrity, it is a chance to present a person's case and their plea to the charges.

Thanks should go to the chairpersons and judiciary panel members for their professional approach to all cases and volunteering their time on Wednesday evenings.

MEDIA REPORT

This year, we adopted a holistic media approach, shifting from a predominant focus on the first-grade men's competition to providing comprehensive coverage of all our products, including various genders, age groups, and our community and inclusive initiatives.

This comprehensive approach led to growth across all digital platforms, yielding notable engagement insights on our website and our social media channels.

Website

Aside from providing essential information such as fixtures, programs, rules and regulations, and other administrative documents, our website serves as a platform to tell the stories of the CRRL through a continuous flow of written content.

In 2024, the site attracted over 260,000 views, with the majority of traffic driven by our articles. Special thanks to Jeff Hanson for his dedicated coverage of the George Tooke Shield, providing engaging weekly write-ups that boost the competition's visibility and contribute to our mission of comprehensive media coverage of all our products. We also thank the clubs for supporting media commitments, as press conferences enhance our senior competition coverage, promoting the CRRL, clubs, and player profiles.

Social Media

The growth of our social media channels this season was particularly satisfying, with over 1,300 new Facebook followers and more than 500 on Instagram.

Fanning inducted into NRL Hall of Fame



The National Rugby League (NRL) formally inducted the first ever female players into the NRL Hall of Fame.

The following players were confirmed as featuring in the Hall of Fame in the 2024 Class: Natalie Dwyer, Katrina Fanning, Tarsha Gale, Veronica White, Karyn Murphy, and Tahnee Norris.

"This is an historic moment for the game – our first ever female players inducted into rugby league's highest honour: the Hall of Fame," ARLC Chairman Peter V'landys AM said.

"This class includes some of the great trailblazers of women's Rugby League. They all significantly helped to put women's Rugby League in the strong position it is today."

Katrina Fanning, ACT Australian of the Year in 2020, is Jillaroo #6 and played 24 Tests, including the inaugural Test against New Zealand in 1995. The Canberra women's Premiership is named the Katrina Fanning Shield in her honour.



Rolling Raiders crowned NSW Cup premiers in inaugural season

The Rolling Raiders achieved the fairytale ending to their inaugural NSW Cup Wheelchair Rugby League season as they lifted the trophy after a triumphant Grand Final victory.



The Raiders rolled into Menai Indoor Sports Centre and secured a dominant 50-36 victory over the minor premiers and competition favourites, the St George Illawarra Dragons.

The unlikely premiers from Canberra had finished last in the four-team competition but remarkably went on a stunning run in the finals to earn their place in the Grand Final.

Their journey to the big dance began with a commanding 60-30 victory over the Wests Tigers in the first week of the finals, followed by another impressive 42-12 win against last year's premiers, the Parramatta Eels, in the preliminary final.

Heading into the Grand Final, the Raiders remained underdogs, having previously suffered significant defeats against the Dragons during the season, losing 56-22 in round three and 50-36 in round six.

But the Toby Popple led Raiders showed up once again, taking an early lead and maintaining control to secure the victory.

Zac Carl played a pivotal role in the win and was recognised with the best on court award for his outstanding four try performance.

CRRL hosts inaugural TackleReady Graduation



The Canberra Region Rugby League (CRRL) held its inaugural TackleReady Program graduation event for all Under 7's, marking a memorable day in their Rugby League journey.

All 37 Under 7's teams in the CRRL undertook their final TackleReady Program session, before showcasing their skills in their first-ever game of tackle rugby league.

Progressing from tag rugby league in Under 6's to a gradual transition into tackle through the TackleReady Program offers young players a safe and structured way to build their skills, confidence, and passion for the game.

Each player received their personalised certificate of completion, representing an important milestone in their development as they move on to play tackle rugby league each week.

The TackleReady Program allows participants to learn correct and safe techniques, preparing them for the tackle version of Rugby League.



The six-session program is delivered by club-appointed TackleReady instructors who are trained and guided by NRL Development Officers, with the aim to increase player confidence and physical competence in all tackling situations.

TackleReady is part of the Player Development Framework which has three main objectives: attract and retain participation, foster personal development, and transition and nurture performance.

The graduation event proved to be a massive success, highlighting the significance of celebrating and recognising this pivotal milestone in their rugby league journey.



Grey socks initiative backing our new referees

Grey socks are the new look for in-training match officials around the grounds, as the Canberra Region Rugby League (CRRL) and the Canberra & District Rugby League Referees Association (CDRLRA) ramp up their support for rookie referees.

For Rugby League supporters attending CRRL fixtures in 2024 and beyond, a match official wearing grey socks signifies that they are first year referees who are still learning their craft.



The grey socks initiative aims to attract more referees and boost retention by creating a positive officiating environment. This includes treating these referees with respect, refraining from abuse, and understanding that they are still learning, just like the players.

By fostering a supportive and encouraging environment, the campaign aims to enhance the experience for new referees and contribute to their development in officiating rugby league matches.

The CRRL's General Manager Mark Vergano said the grey socks represent a strong message to the rugby league community and aims to mitigate prominent behavioural issues from spectators.

"The grey socks initiative sees a number of sports in the ACT actively identifying the newer referees, so spectators, parents and coaches understand that we have a young person in training and learning their craft," Vergano said.

"The main messages for the rugby league community is that a less experienced referee needs time, support, positive reinforcement and understanding from those not in the centre, so that we help nurture them and not drive them away by negative sideline reactions, criticism and abuse.

"Unfortunately, across many sports there are supporters who seem to forget that the match officials are also participants doing a job to the best of their ability and just one instance of bad behaviour on the sidelines with criticism or being disrespectful does cost sports match officials.

"We are hoping that with a visual cue, spectators, parents and coaches will be reminded that young referees need nurturing and support not criticism and abuse."



Introducing the Junior Bushrangers Pathway



An important development for rugby league in the Tuggeranong Valley emerged in 2024, with the four Tuggeranong based clubs establishing a collaborative partnership to improve awareness of rugby league within the region.

Under the initiative, all male players in the under 15s, and those registered for girls-only competitions from the Tuggeranong Buffaloes, Valley Dragons, and South Tuggeranong Knights, competed under one unified banner as the Tuggeranong Bushrangers.

This partnership aims to encourage and facilitate opportunities for increased participation of male international and female age groups by streamlining registrations for the nominated age groups, while also clearly defining a pathway from junior to senior rugby league in the Tuggeranong Valley.

In the development of the agreement, the four Tuggeranong clubs emphasised the importance of allowing players to continue to compete under their junior banner, honouring the heritage and identity of their junior clubs before combining to enter the Bushrangers pathway.

The agreement encompasses a three-year implementation plan before it is in full effect, with an option of extension.

Starting from 2024, all girls registered to play in the girls only competitions will play under the Tuggeranong Bushrangers brand. Regarding the boys, integration commenced with the under 15s, progressing with the 15s and 16s in 2025, and culminating in the integration of under 15s, 16s, and 17s boys in 2026.



Congratulations to Steve Hewson OAM

The CRRL would like to congratulate Steve Hewson for receiving a Medal of the Order of Australia (OAM) in this year's Australia Day Honours for service to Rugby League.

Steve is a Queanbeyan Blues and Monaro legend, also known for his representation for NSW Country and NSW.

In 1975, he was named the Country Player of the Year after an upset victory against the City Firsts. In the same year, he played for NSW against Queensland, scoring a try in all his appearances.



Recently, Hewson was awarded the OAM for services to Rugby League highlighted by his post-playing career, particularly his contributions to Wheelchair Rugby League.

The former representative halfback has been integral in the development of Wheelchair Rugby League, representing various roles within the sport.

Notably, he coached the Australian Wheelchair Rugby League team (Wheelaroos) as well as the inaugural NSW Wheelchair State of Origin squad. He was also appointed as a referee for the 2022 Wheelchair Rugby League World Cup.

Without Steve, Canberra Region Wheelchair Rugby League wouldn't be where it is today, as he played a pivotal role in establishing the program and continues to assist in the thriving and growing community.

Additionally, Hewson was a Development Officer for the Canberra Raiders in the 1980s and coached their SG Ball team, as well the Queanbeyan Blues Under 17s, Under 19s, and Reserve Grade sides.



OBITUARIES

Ricky White

The Canberra Region Rugby League celebrates the life of Richard 'Ricky' White, who passed away on 11 December 2023, remembering him as a legendary figure in Canberra rugby league.

Ricky primarily represented a Gungahlin Bulls foundation club, the Belconnen United Panthers, formed in 1969 when the Belconnen District was only a few years old.

He captain-coached the Panthers in the 70s, guiding the side to their first grand final in 1973. He built the foundation for the club which propelled them to win five consecutive premierships in proceeding years (1975-1979).




Figure 39 - Ricky White

He also captain-coached West Belconnen to their first ever grand final, before returning to help a struggling Panthers outfit in 1986.

Additionally, Ricky played for the Canberra Workers and Ainslie, featuring in over 450 rugby league games in his playing career.

<u>Ray Dunbar</u>

The Canberra Region Rugby League pays tribute to Raymond 'Ray' Dunbar, who passed away on 23 February 2024, honouring his lasting contributions to the game and the community.

Ray began his rugby league journey playing in Wagga, representing the Wagga Magpies JRLFC and the Wagga Kangaroos RLFC, winning a few premierships along the way.

He made the move from Wagga Wagga to Canberra in the late 1950's, where he eventually started his coaching career.






Figure 40 - Ray Dunbar

Rugby Union before coaching multiple Lakes United sides from 1975 till the late 1970's.

From there, he went on to become a back-to-back premiership winning coach for East Canberra's Under 15/16's side in 1979 and 1980.

Ray also coached and managed many successful Canberra District Minor Rugby League teams, including the 1978 Harold Matthews Cup winning side that defeated Parramatta in the final.

"Whilst success was often a direct result of the skill and talent of the players, management and coaching staff, the players and their families were made to feel welcome and enjoyed a playing environment where everyone gave 100%," said Gary Dunbar, one of three of Ray's children.

"Team BBQs and get togethers made for an even closer-knit family environment that will be fondly remembered by all.

"He was a husband, father, grandfather and great grandfather. A clubman, coach, mentor, and volunteer that did so much for the game he loved, not for the want of praise and recognition, but for those that wanted to be part of the same team, club and family".



Brian Bourke

The Canberra Region Rugby League and Canberra Raiders honor the life and legacy of Brian Bourke, a former Queanbeyan Blues player and founding Raiders staff member, who sadly passed away on 26 May 2024.

Brian played for the Queanbeyan Blues from 1959-1976. Post-playing career he was heavily involved in sports training and was the Canberra Raider's inaugural Head Trainer working alongside coach Don Furner senior.

Such was his stature in the local rugby league community, he was immortalised with a statue that still resides in the Queanbeyan Leagues Club.




Figure 41 - Brian Bourke statue at Queanbeyan Leagues Club

Carol Henry




Figure 43 - Carol Henry

Graham was a passionate supporter of women's rugby league, coaching numerous teams in the 1990's locally, then the ACT representative teams and finally was the inaugural Jillaroos coach.

Players such as Cath Welch, Katrina Fanning, Maree Bush, Rom Emmanuel, Robyn Miller are just some of the players who had the privilege of being coached by Graham.

Graham had played with the North Sydney Bears (#598) in Sydney before relocating to Canberra where he also later became involved with the local Men of League chapter.

In recent years, Graham once again became associated with the Open Women's rugby league with the re-establishment of a women's tackle competition and the first representative sides in many years.

Graham once again was out searching for talent and the CRRL was honoured to have Graham's expertise and passion help us guide the new generation of players.

Graham's influence is best summarised by the reminiscences and tribute of two of his former players; Cath Welch and Maree Bush.

Cath Welch recounts:

A mildly spoken man who was passionate about sharing his knowledge of footy both as a player and coach. Graham coached club, ACT and Jillaroo women's rugby league teams in the 90's and early 2000's when women playing rugby league was not so much an acceptable thing. He always defended the ability of women to play the game and promoted their achievements in the game.

He was awarded as a Life Member of Canberra Women's Rugby League in 1998 and the Coach of the Year in the Katrina Fanning Shield is named in his honour.

I first met Graham over 30 years ago, his love and knowledge of the game was always evident, as a spectator, player, coach and friend. He was very proud of how the women's game had progressed and become not only acceptable but popular.



I played in many teams coached by Graham during the 90's, however I think he was in his element during 1997 and 1998 when as Coach with his wife Penny as Manager, daughters Vanessa as player and Yvette as Sports Trainer he coached the Rams to victories in both Grand Finals. His love of family and footy celebrated.

Maree Bush recalls:

The first I got to know of Graham Willard was when he coached East Canberra in my early years of playing for Rams, he was able to bring together a formidable team that always made sure my Rams came in 2nd. It wasn't till 1994 when he we both moved to the Valley Dragons that I first had the privilege of seeing first hand what a wonderful coach he was.

As a coach, he had the ability to watch a player, identify and build both a player's strengths and weaknesses, improving on their confidence and playing abilities.

In 95' when the comp was in need of another team, he became my sounding board when I decided to build the Queanbyan Blues women's team, assisting and encouraging me, all to the benefit and future of the women's game.

I was able to rejoin Graham at the Rams in 1997 and again in 1998, he was the proudest of coaches when he took us to grand final wins in both years. These 2 years were made even more special with the family environment he created by bringing along his beautiful wife and biggest support, Penny, his daughter Vanessa as a player and his daughter Yvette as our strapper.

Many of the players knew him as Dad because of the way he treated us, although he later got the moniker "Uncle Arthur" (referenced from the comedy company). He had a wonderful sense of humour.




